This year saw the first external examinations back in school since 2019. The Year 11s faced them with great resilience and really stepped up to the pressure. Their hard work both in school and at home to overcome the impact of the Covid lockdown will pay off and we are expecting some excellent results in August. It was fantastic see Year 11s celebrating all the way with an emotional school Leaver's Assembly send-off and a glamourous Prom at the Edgbaston Park Hotel.

Putting in those extra special days and activities that enrich the curriculum and bond the school community together, getting back to our pre-Covid normal has been so important to us. A highlight included 180 pupils spending two nights at the Acorns Adventure Centre in the Brecon Beacons for a full-on outdoor learning experience. Another welcome return to the calendar was Year 8 Diversity Day. The day was jam packed with art, performance poetry and music workshops. The poetry was a continuation of the TuneUp Project where pupils in Years 7-10 worked with a professional poet and Art Ambassadors from King Edward VI High School for the Culture in Common Festival for The Commonwealth Games. Watch out for our pupils reading their poetry on screens around the city during the Games.

Hopefully you will have spotted The Jingle Truck in The Birmingham Mail and on Central News recently. This was led by Mrs Allen for the



Commonwealth Connections Project linking six local schools together with a school in Pakistan. It made an appearance at school last week and accompanied by Mrs Vizor and the Year 7 and 9 Changemakers in a baton relay around all six schools. K EVI Northfield have continued to develop pupil experiences and understanding of Engineering during the second year of this five-year programme.

You may recall from earlier in the year that some Year 9 groups participated in an autonomous vehicle challenge, run by the Smallpeice Trust.

Pupils in Year 8 also worked towards a CREST award during Science lessons to mark Science week and those completing the task will soon be receiving a certificate for their award. We recently received a 3D printer via the grant for this programme. Year 8 pupils have initially been viewing the printer as it creates our first models

(with a boat being the first item off the print bed).

Technology will now be able to



expand projects to include the ability to carry out 3D printing, and enable pupils to better understand its applications and links to industry and future careers. Speaker kits have also been purchased which will now allow all pupils to build working speakers as part of their curriculum, which we hope will encourage an interest in Engineering of sound equipment (and beyond)! We look forward to developing engineering further over the next three years. There are a range of excellent careers which we encourage pupils to consider for the future. Any pupil with a strong interest in following this path is encouraged to see Mr Jackson so he can pass on any opportunities arising from the programme.






