

t has been another full term here at King Edward VI Northfield School for Girls. In what seems like an age ago, our Leavers received their exam results at the end of the summer – securing fantastic outcomes, particularly in Graphics, Textiles, English, Music and History after an extremely challenging few years disrupted by the Covid pandemic.

Shortly after, we were joined by our now not-so-new Year 7s, who threw themselves into school life, despite the huge change from primary to secondary school. Our other year groups, particularly Year 8 and Year 10 have made particularly strong progress this term.

Our programme of clubs and boosters has continued to grow, and now reaches as many as 700 attendances each week. Our first Enrichment Day saw excellent engagement in educational visits as varied as

Walsall Art Gallery and Arboretum, Twycross Zoo, Croome Park, the Nottingham Court of Justice, Carding Mill Valley and Stratford-upon-Avon.

Whilst our staff absences have remained well below some other schools, and thus avoided us having to take difficult decisions around year groups having to stay at home, small outbreaks of illness (particularly in these last weeks) has added to staff workload as we cover a few more lessons and do our best to maintain the quality of education we deliver. We have been fortunate in this regard, in that our former headteacher, Mr Crookes, was willing and able to step back into the breach once more to cover a longer-term absence.

Being part of the King Edward VI Foundation is bringing a number of benefits, including support and challenge for key subject leaders, but perhaps most excitingly in giving growing numbers of our pupils access to King Edward VI Sixth Forms. Both King Edward VI Lordswood

We look forward to using their expertise and experience to continue to build upon the strong quality of education we already provide as we strive toward becoming the school this community deserves.

I would like to wish all of our pupils and their families a fantastic Christmas, despite the pressures many families are facing. I would also like to thank parents for their support for their children and the school in helping to deal with the challenges which inevitably arise. I reflect on a term where, together, despite sometimes getting some things wrong, we continue to get a great deal right.




