A Time of Change

t has been a bit bitter-sweet watching our old West Block being demolished. Thousands of children have been taught French, Maths, Music and Computing in the block as decades have past. Dozens of teachers have given the best years of the professional life in the building, spending untold hours teaching, marking and planning. Exams were taken in West Hall, and qualifications achieved.

On the other hand, drafty rooms had been almost impossible to adequately heat, the ancient flat roofs leaked despite constant repairs and the boiler and pipes seemed to be in constant competition for what would break first each winter. On balance, while we say good bye with some happy memories, we look ahead to our £22 million beautiful new building with excitement. Of course, this transitional time throws up some challenges, but our pupils and staff have risen to the occasion magnificently. Corridors are certainly more crowded, but orderly as students show each other courtesy and demonstrate patience.



In the now distant summer our Year 11 Leavers sat their exams and produced an excellent set of results. The percentage of our pupils achieving 5+ in both Maths and English was more than double that of some other schools in our constituency and the Graphics, History, English, Sports, Dance, RE and Health and Social Care results were particularly outstanding.

Educational Visits and Breakfasts

Our hard-working staff and student volunteers have continued to prepare free healthy bagels for breakfast for every pupil who wants one (almost 60% of students take advantage of the offer), and we have now started our enrichment strategy that provides thirteen educational visits or experiences for all of our pupils free of charge. The first day of trips in October saw successful visits to London, Oxford, Nottingham, a countryside walk and sports coaching experiences take place. We await a second day of visits next term with anticipation.

British gymnast at World Age Group Tumbling Championships

aeda-Lei in Year 8 competed at the Worlds Age Group Tumbling Championships in Russia this week and secured herself a gold medal.

Britain's junior tumbling gymnasts produced sensational results at the 2019 Trampoline, Tumbling & DMT World Age Group Championships to conclude a fantastic four days in Tokyo. The opening two days of competition saw GB claim five medals, with the final

two days bringing eight more, showcasing the strength in depth across the disciplines. The 11-12 age group was the youngest on show at the Championships, but it was where GB's tumbling gymnasts shone. In the women's final, British gymnasts incredibly claimed the top four places. Jaeda-Lei secured gold with 32.200, Lottie silver with 31.500, Alicia won bronze (placing behind Lottie on

execution score) scoring 31.500 and Sophie finished just outside the medals in fourth with 31.00.



uring November 8JS and 9B History groups took part in "Osteo Live". During these sessions the pupils took part in a Skype lecture and question and answer session with an archaeologist working on the HS2 site in Birmingham. In recent moves several thousand skeletal remains have been excavated and studied. Archaeologists have been learning about the lives of the people who lived in Birmingham and the pupils learned how to estimate the



height of a person from their femur, how to estimate age, how to identify whether a skeleton is male or female and also other clues about health and diet.



Year 9 recently took part in the "Big Assembly", run by Shell. Pupils took part in a nationwide question and

answer session with several people working in a variety of engineering careers. The session allows the pupils to consider the advantages and realities of these careers.

Engineering is a very varied career path and has links to many (if not all) areas of interest. There are many companies supporting people (especially young

women) interested in these careers and pupils are encouraged to research this more - there are links on Moodle and pupils can speak to their Science and Technology teachers as well as our careers advisor, Anna Perry, in school about this.

In an interview about the event, one of the students explained "I was speaking to a woman and she said she had no friends in the retirement home, so this is obviously why we're doing this, so they can make friends and also socialise with us." Feedback from everyone involved was overwhelmingly positive, with one of the visitors saying "We had such a laugh, so much fun...everybody was so friendly and the food was lovely and the girls had made all that themselves. I it's good for older people to mix with the children. They made us feel very

welcome."

Special thanks must be given to Jade Morgan, who has mentored Chloe, Megan and Maya since they won the award and helped them organise the logistics and financing of the event. Also special thanks to Tanya Jones from Selly Oak Live at Home Scheme for generating interest and organizing transport for the visitors.


