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I write with a number of reminders primarily about the imminent day of industrial action that the National Education Union (NEU) is taking Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> May. The crisis of teacher recruitment and retention underlying the industrial dispute is highlighted by the latest Initial Teacher Training forecast for 2023/24 showing the government's own target for secondary teacher recruitment will be missed by over 50%. This means that secondary schools will, quite simply, not have enough skilled and qualified teachers in the years ahead which risks incalculable damage to children's life chances.

## 1) Industrial Action

On Tuesday 2nd May:

- 1) Year 10 and Year 11 please attend school as normal. Once again, I am very pleased that a number of NEU colleagues will be coming into school specifically for their Year 11 lessons, despite not being paid to do so.
- Year 7, Year 8 and Year 9 please work from home, accessing work on TEAMs and work on <u>the Oak National Academy</u>. Please email <u>it-support@nsg.kevibham.org</u> for any technical support.
- 3) Any pupils in Years 7, 8 and 9 (or their families) who wish to pick up a packed lunch throughout the day may pop into reception at any stage to do so.
- 4) We have already invited a number of pupils in Years 7, 8 and 9 to attend for specific individual reasons and the relevant parents will be aware of this. If you are a key worker or you have a different reason you wish your child to be supervised in school on this day, please email <u>enquiry@nsg.kevibham.org</u> with the title '2<sup>nd</sup> May'.
- 5) Most school extra-curricular clubs will still run on Tuesday (Science Club, Ensemble, Netball, Drama, Kindle Classics, Future Creatives, Netball, Chess Club and Homework Club). Pupils in Years 7, 8 and 9 and welcome to come into school at 3.15 to attend these clubs and there will be no expectation that they wear school uniform.

## 2) PE Kit

Participating in PE lessons not only helps to develop their physical fitness, but also promotes mental well-being, confidence and important social skills. In addition, regular exercise has been shown to improve academic performance and reduce stress and anxiety levels.
