ear 10 Aspire students had Professor Mike Coleman from Aston University to talk to them, some students from King Norton Girls' School and Lordswood Girls' on Wednesday 27th September. His major research includes the use of human cellular systems to replace animal testing in research to increase the reliability of this research. He applies this to study and therapy of neurodegenerative diseases. Despite this topic being very academic he managed to illustrate it clearly with some humorous references to make it more accessible to GCSE students. He also discussed how working as a Scientist requires team work and how this is vital to his approach to research in Toxicology. It was a fabulous

opportunity to hear from someone working in the top of his field to inspire our students to aim high.

from a wide variety

of fields. From publishing pioneer Jessica Huntley, musician Dame Shirley Bassey to black women in the military, politics, the entertainment industry, STEM, sports, business, social activism, finance, health, and those who have revolutionised the way black girls view, accept, appreciate, and style their hair.
